
Clumber Park and its history


Chapel Interior

Step inside Clumber Park's beautiful Chapel also known as 'Cathedral in Miniature'. Built by the 7th Duke of Newcastle the interior of this spectacular building has so many gems. Due to this being a working Chapel, sessions must be arranged through the Chapel & Collections Officer. Group sizes are limited to 20 people and a rule of pencils only is in place to protect this special place.



Walled Kitchen Garden

This gives you a real glimpse into Clumber Park's history. With the longest glass house in the National Trust's care, a National Rhubarb Collection and 'outlawed' vegetables, there is plenty here to get the creative juices flowing. Out of consideration to our visitors, groups here will be limited to a maximum of six and will be situated outside the glass house. Please book via the website.



Artist's Way Dates for the Diary

The Duke's Study

The last remaining part of Clumber House is the Duke's Study, which now houses Clumber Park's Cafe. Looking at its exterior gives you a real impression of just how grand the house would have been.
