

Poldhu Marconi Centre

Just over 100 years ago, Guglielmo Marconi made the first Transatlantic wireless broadcast from the cliffs at Poldhu, thus paving the way for modern forms of communication. To celebrate this historic event, the Marconi Centre was built in 2001. Located close to the foundations of the original Poldhu Wireless Station, the centre explores the story of Marconi, and his place in history through an exhibition and video presentation.

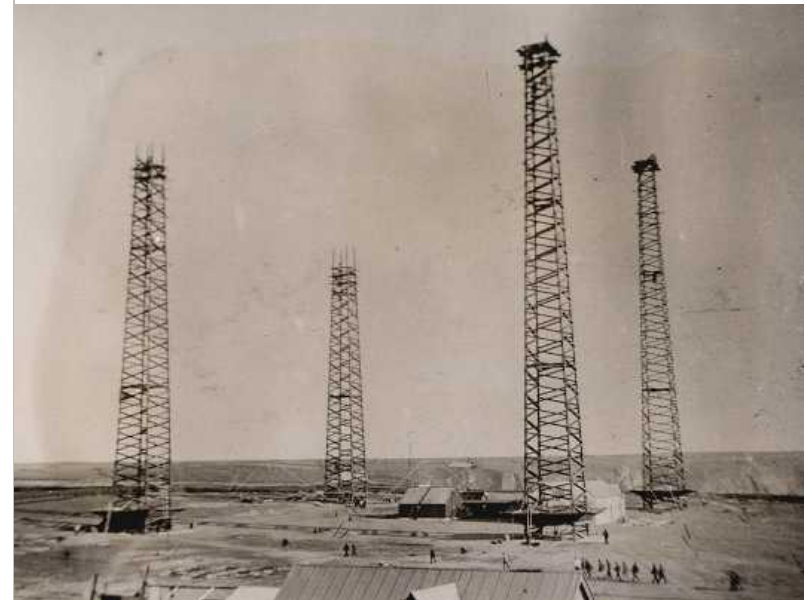
